
As you see, the fox has his Santa hat on, so Happy Christmas one and all and here's hoping that 2026 bring us the big present of League football.

CAN WE DO IT?


Nick Dawson has been talking to AI again. You will recall that in October the "Monte Carlo simulation" predicted us to finish 1st or 2nd with around 95 points. Nick ran the model again on 3rd December based on the current points per game being achieved by the top ten clubs, as shown below.



Each teams remaining matches were then simulated in 10,000 iterations, using a conservative smoothed estimate of its win/draw/loss probabilities derived from current record. This is a simplified model and does not simulate head-to-head fixtures explicitly. This results in us being predicted to finish second,



A bit more detail



Carlisle United have a 9.7% likelihood of being top, a 39.4% likelihood of being first or second and a 63.6% likelihood of being in the top three, in a tight race among the current top five teams.

The 10,000 iterations of our matches indicate that we are most likely to finish with over 100 points - and it looks as if we'll need them!

KIEIEIP THE FAITH



Our FA Cup defeat by Blackpool was obviously disappointing and doubly so that we couldn't make more of a fight of it. There was no coming back after being 3-0 down at half time. At least we can focus on the league now. I'm just hoping that there isn't a reaction from the FA Cup defeat when the team runs out against Woking. As far as I'm concerned, even though I'm going to Market Harborough this Saturday, we can put out a reserve team against Harborough Town in the FA Trophy. Promotion out of the National League is our sole aim now. It would still be good to progress though, as it

will give those players not seeing much first team football invaluable competitive game time.

It was good to see Hayden Atkinson get an outing against Blackpool. Although we have a bit of an emergency at centre back, with Mugabi and Thomas long term injured, Feeney ill and potential replacement Grant also out injured, it was surprising to hear he'd been recalled from loan at Workington and unusual to see a youth team player (Atkinson is only 17) get on the pitch in such an important game, albeit when the game was basically done and dusted. I'm sure he'll be starting the match at Harborough. Hopefully, he can progress to be our next Academy graduate to play regular first team football.

Which brings me to the uncertainty surrounding the Academy. The club, at this juncture, could have done without the loss of its Academy Manager. I'm saying this because the prospects for the future of the Academy are a bit up in the air, so it's not a good time to try and recruit someone of high calibre to run it. The big threat is the potential loss of funding if we fail to get promoted back to the EFL at the first attempt.

As you're probably aware we lose half the grant to the Academy if we remain in the National League for more than one year and all of it if we're still there after two years. The club's last annual accounts showed that this grant was approximately £0.5 million.

A number of clubs relegated out of the Football League have had their academy status downgraded, or lost their academy completely, as a result of relegation out of the Football League and their failure to get back within two years. The same fate awaits Carlisle if they are down more then two years. Of course it can be quickly regained on promotion again. Oldham Athletic got back after three years and have had their category 3 status restored. On the other hand Scunthorpe lost their academy completely. There are other downsides to losing category 3 status as well. Apart from the loss of funding, the club will also lose the right for compensation for any players in the academy signed by another professional club. If the club were to adopt a self-funded category 4 status this would mean that we would operate only from the Under-17 age group upwards and lose the U9-U16 age groups covered by category 3. Additionally, the youth teams would have to leave the official EFL Youth Alliance league and find alternative

competitive games.

Can we expect the Piataks to fully fund the potential loss of income? They obviously don't have a bottomless pit of money and, in any event, it's likely that additional money spent on the academy will mean less money for other projects.


Keeping up with other clubs in terms of spending means that owners have to reach deeper and deeper into their pockets. There's a lot of money being invested in football in this country, and that's at all levels of the game. The latest that's come to my attention is Wrexham - yet again. Not satisfied with the income received as a result of the takeover by wealthy celebrity film stars and the spin-off commercial income from TV, they've been fishing for other investors and have landed the new owners of Atletico Madrid as minority investors. To those that have will be given more! However, that's not the worst of it. I scrolled down the BBC news item on this and came across this headline:- "Football stadium's £18m grant will 'transform Wrexham' says minister". I immediately thought surely this is not public money being used to fund an already commercially viable and seemingly well off football club? Oh yes it is! It's being justified by the Labour Welsh Minister for Culture as regenerating the heart of Wrexham but it's basically being provided to build a new stand at what used to be called the Racecourse Ground, as well as upgrades to floodlights, pitch and other stadium infrastructure. Perhaps the good residents of Wrexham are happy with this but I suspect that the vast majority of money is coming from the Welsh government which in turn gets 50% of its money from central government coffers. In other words the money is yours and mine that is being used! At a time when public services are at such a low ebb having been starved of cash, I don't think that this is an appropriate way to spend public money. I suspect we won't have heard the last of this.

Anyway enough of other club's finances and doom and gloom about the potential future of our academy. We have the busy festive season rush of games coming up. Fingers crossed that we don't run into problems over this period and that we can ease ourselves away from one or two more teams battling it out at the top. It's probably not the best time to remind people that we've beaten Morecambe only once in 9 home league games. We'll make it 2 in 10.

HTB! IS THE OLDEST, CONTINUOUSLY IN-PRINT FOOTBALL FANZINE

It's official. Hit the Bar! is confirmed as the oldest, continuously in-print football fanzine in the UK.



This achievement was confirmed by research carried out by Pete Slater, author of the excellent Football Fanzine Culture blog. Leeds-based Pete set himself the task of researching the rich history of football fanzine culture and in the summer of 2025 he shared his findings at the *Voice of the Fans* exhibition, a co-production from Leeds Libraries and the British Library.

News from the Leeds event reached

London Branch that Pete had the evidence that Hit the Bar is the UK's oldest, still published fanzine. Following a fascinating zoom call, Pete sent through his findings and these form the basis for the article below. Full details and many more fascinating fanzine-based articles are at:

Pete is in contact with the CUFC Heritage Group and plans to visit Brunton Park in the New Year to see the fanzine collection brought together by the group.

So what is a Fanzine?

Perhaps before we go any further, we need to consider what is/was a fanzine in the context of this article. In Pete's view they must fulfil three criteria:

- By fans, totally independent of their subject
- Be self-published
 Use amateur, unpaid contributors

In the beginning

The first true independent football fanzine is a Celtic 'zine called The Shamrock, published as early as 1962 by an Edinburgh based supporter of Celtic. The first general football fanzine, Foul, came along in 1972 but neither of these lasted too long. Shamrock ceased when Jock Stein was appointed and Celtic started winning again and Foul was the first of many fanzines to fall 'foul' of the law.



So what was the different in the 70s and 80s that allowed fanzines to breathe and prosper? The 70s and 80s were a time of tremendous social upheaval in Britain; the economy was a mess and old social/business norms were falling away for a variety of positive and negative reasons. Football supporting was a microcosm of this, fans were painted with a broad brush through very critical eves focussed on a minority of supporters causing problems. Clubs were run as fiefdoms by people who saw them as a cash cow with little regard for the safety or comfort of fans and the way clubs communicated was pitiful. The printed press was largely a compliant mouthpiece, and the match day magazine might have a brief, ghost-written column by the manager but that was it.

Self-publishing was enabled by changes in 'technology'. The printing and copying devices now available created a sort of second Gutenberg moment, publication became 'free' again. These changes are often overlooked but the move from Mimeographs to Letraset, Gestetners, risograph printers and Roneo machines, then onto photocopiers was a huge shift and played a massive part in enabling scores of 'proto' writers to live out their dream without worrying about publishers, costs and in some cases too many strictures around grammar and spelling

Fanzines numbers exploded, some of the more successful zines were selling upwards of 20,000 editions a time and more still exist in print form than you would imagine. Bradford City's The City Gent is still here, one of the oldest continuously produced fanzines around and still managing to sell 700+ editions when published. Remarkably, The Gent has outlived the Bradford City match day magazine, not published for a couple of years now.

How many fanzines are there, how many were there?

Pete soon realised that the answer to that question was far from easy to find. "I started thinking about how many fanzines there had been. I assumed that this would be an easy task and was sure a list would already exist, surely someone had thought "I'll make a list of every football fanzine that existed, including its price, start and end dates, anecdotes about the fanzine, links to copies still available and if it moved online." You know where I'm heading with this, a Sisyphean task, it took a year to 'complete' (it will never be complete). So how did the list 'arrive'? Come with me down this rabbit hole."

Having realised that a 'google search' wasn't going to provide the answer, Pete found lists of fanzines in the National Football Museum and National Library of Scotland and remembered that until May 2000, the magazine "When Saturday Comes" carried a listing of 400 titles.

Promotion of the Voice of the Fans exhibition resulted in Pete making contact with many former and current editors and contributors. This was combined with trips to view the surprising number of fanzine collections in academic institutions around the country. Perhaps the

best of these is the National Library of Scotland (NLS) and their ly incredible collection of Scottish fanzines. He noted other excellent 'local' collections are located at: Carlisle University, University College Cork, York University, British Library London, Exeter University archive, the Bishopsgate Institute, Leeds Central Library, People's Collection Wales (online), Football Museum in Manchester, Dundee FC Historical Society and the Charlton FC Museum (matchdays only). In a surreal twist there is also a very good collection of largely Shrewsbury fanzines at the De Paul University in Chicago, I'm sure there are many more.

The List

Pete set about creating the definitive list of fanzines as part of the preparation for <u>Voice of the Fans</u>, the exhibition on football fanzines and fanzine culture at Leeds Central Library in the summer of 2025. The list includes key statistics about each fanzine (date first published, number of editions etc.)

So, How many Fanzines have there been?

The total number of fanzines Pete has listed as being for sale in the British Isles is currently 1,771. In the English League structure there have been 958 fanzines with 312 in the English non-league structure. Only four of the established big clubs today appear in the top 10 in terms of number of fanzines per club.

In the Scottish Senior structure he found 198 and a further 38 in the Scottish Junior leagues, with Hearts

seemingly having had the most prolific writer fan-base across the British Isles. There are 71 still in print with eight of those resolutely in print form only.

Which is the oldest fanzine?

And here we are, top of the league!
As the table shows, the oldest, continuously in-print fanzine is Hit the Bar, the Carlisle United fanzine running since 1974 and still going strong!! Hit The Bar is also the first and so far only fanzine to hit 50 years old. Pete commenting; "Incredible support through thick and thin for one of the great footballing outposts of the isles. A great fanzine and a brilliant achievement."

What is remarkable about this classification is that only four of the 20 are 'big' clubs. This proves once again that the meaning of 'big' in football and fanzine world is not literal. As the perfect example of this, Leyton Orient deserve a special mention as they have TWO fanzines in the Premier League! Plus there are two 'non-league' sides here, Hereford and Merthyr, still going after all these years, with Barrow not long back in the league structure as well!!

Some of the fanzines in this top 20 are still edited by their creators, some onto the third generation of troops manning the barricades.

Chapeau to each and every one of you but especially to 'little' Carlisle United and the team behind the venerable old man, Hit The Bar, we suspect you might be champion for a while yet (Well, at least nine years anyway).

Number of issues published

Once again, a truly astounding table, perhaps more skewed to better supported clubs with broader reach in this case. That makes Middlesbrough's Fly Me to The Moon's achievement even more remarkable, as is the fact that this landmark was reached without anyone realising in the game vs Oxford the 19th March this year. Hit the Bar again appears – this time in 7th between two Salford-based and now-defunct fanzines, with a now a total of 339 copies. However, not all these fanzines are still going, an asterisk * denotes the ones still in print. On this basis, Hit the Bar sits third in the table behind Fly me the Moon and QPR's Kick up the R's and ahead of Arsenal's 37 year-old Gooner.

We're not alone: the other Carlisle Fanzines

Following our zoom conversation, Peter very kindly provided the information he had collated about other Carlisle fanzines. He reports:

"We've traced 11 or 12 Carlisle fanzines over the years which is quite incredible for a club this size. To give you an idea other clubs that have had 12 fanzines are Liverpool, Southend United, Watford, Plymouth Argyle, Leicester City, Rangers and Reading.

To put this in perspective, if you add ALL of the fanzines from your main rivals in the fanzine era (Barrow, Preston, Hartlepool and Workington) have only 20 between them with 15 of those coming from Preston

Coppermill Swifts v CUSCLB FC

Date: 08.11.25

Venue: Low Hall, South Access Road,

This report must start with a note of thanks: A huge "thank you" in fact, to Stef & Nigel at CUFC and Dave and Simon. Between them they not only managed to sign-off and collate a brand-new supporters team kit but impressively had the whole lot packed and shipped directly to me.

With a new kit at the ready, we just needed an opposition to face. Easier said than done. With the best opportunities falling in August and before most pitches were marked and set-up, it was a scan down the fixture list for the next best possible opportunity. 'Southend Away' with a later kick-off time could work but without a supporter's team to play, we had to look elsewhere. Gillingham fans? A logistical travelling nightmare. Orient fans? They had been due to play the Coppermill Swifts but a 12:30pm kick-off for Orient marked the end of that. How about we step in? Coppermill were absolutely on board. Opposition sorted, could we muster enough bodies ourselves. A week prior, heading to Reading the answer was "no". At one point we'd dropped to 8 and that was likely that. Last chance saloon then, Steve Batey and Jugsy went on a recruitment charge and pulled in a couple of potential new players at the London Branch meet-up boozer, The Greyfriar. Dave Scott kindly offered what body he could after a recent knee operation. With one other potential, it was a risk but worth a shot: GAME ON!

In the week came the great news Joseph Scott was available, which meant Dave was definitely 'up for it'. Scott Naylor, one of the new recruits in Reading had decided that a drive from Swin-

don just to pull on the new blue kit was worth it's while and signed up, Jugsy was 100% there....and we'd reached the magic number – 12 to be precise. Dave Scott offered to stand in goal if we were short of a 'keeper, which we were!

Here is where the thanks continue: The magnificent 12 players, Neil Nixon and Suzanne Batey in support, along with Scott's family who had joined him in the drive from Swindon.

We were set; the weather and pitch were ideal, the kit looked stunning.

Although due for a 10:30am kick-off it was all fairly relaxed and at 10:45am we got under way, CUSCLB FC kicking off the first game of the new kit era.

Even though we had a 12th man, at the Swifts request we went without lino's and let the Ref decide such decisions. Apparently having lino's had caused more problems than their worth for the Swifts in recent matches, so we were happy to oblige. We had no plans to play a high line!

Dave in goal, Steve and Dobbo at full back, Tom and Ralph in the heart of the defence. They were shielded by Captain Tembey as a holding midfielder, leaving Lucas and Joseph to sit as the advanced midfield pairing. Gijs, Scott and Jugsy would rotate on the flanks and Harvey played the lone ranger up top. Work



with the tools at your disposal they say, well these proved to be weapons more than tools!

The morning dew made the surface wet and the ball even more so, that being said there were some really good passages of play and we started well which led to confidence building. Given our last 11-a-side game was 18 months ago, it was an impressive sight to see the team click. Dobbo and Jugsy were creating so much down the right and creating moments not only for Harvey but the two advanced midfielders. Jugsv was even dishing out some back-heel passes. The left hand-side was carefully dealt with and Tom and Ralph were clearing their lines for fun. Harvev's task was tough but the reward of a goal was soon to follow, a fine ball from Jugsy into the box saw confusion between the Swifts 'keeper and one of their centre-halves. They collided together and missed the ball, leaving Harvey with the glorious task of rolling the ball into an empty net. The 'Linney-CCC

handshake' was deployed for the first time and our tails were well and truly up. 1-0

The Swifts were keen to persist playing out from the back and this would prove to be their downfall. A loose pass across the edge of the box was met by the onrushing Harvey, who took a touch and then lifted it beautifully over the 'keeper and into the net. 2-0

After that the Swifts went more direct and deployed their one real threat – the long throw in (yes, it really is back!). Long balls into the channels were the tactic which CUSCLB FC dealt with relatively well, Joseph's height a real help defending any resulting throw-ins.

It was the Carlisle boys in blue who would play the better football and a neat one-two between Lucas and Gijs sent Lucas through on the inside left. A great run was met by an even better finish, a sweet left foot strike across the 'keeper and into the far corner. 3-0.

Now in dreamland it was just a case of seeing things through to half-time. Unfortunately, we didn't quite make it. Another long throw came in from our right and the flick this time eluded everyone, Dave included. The ball landed a yard from goal to see an easy tap-in for the Swifts and a glimmer of hope for the second half. 3-1

The half time team talk was still positive and confidence was high with a belief that we could carry things on in the second half.

The Swifts chasing the game went fullon direct and for the blues it was just a case of standing strong, looking to hit on the break. Carlisle did just that with the move of the game. Captain Tembey found Gijs on the right wing who sent Harvey away further down the line, his deep cross to the far post was met expertly by young Lucas, who's cushioned volley cut back was perfect for the onrushing Joseph to smash into the top of the net. 4-1

Now it was just a case of seeing the game out. Not helped when Tembey Snr failed to flick on Dave's bye-kick, the Swifts midfielder nipped in and sent the ball into the area before it was clipped over the onrushing Dave. 4-2

After that Joseph became a defensive rock, his height and heading protected the goal from multiple long throw ins and the one-time Dave was beaten, Dobbo was in the right place to head brilliantly away off the line. Was the trek to see TamWORTH IT?

Dave Spencer shares the agony of a day out on the railways.

I've made the long 2 leg slog from Brighton to see Carlisle play a few times and the journey has always worked like clockwork.

Eager to see Carlisle brush aside Tamworth I get up at 07:30, a brisk 30 minute walk to Brighton station and then onwards via a short underground hop from Victoria to Euston, providing a useful 40 minute rest for scran at Euston's Pret a Manger.

Only 2 British Rail trains, and we start with Brighton. Er...but we don't.

The departure board at Brighton as expected shows the first leg to Victoria at 08:39 - but what is that addition? 'Cancelled'.

Is that the end before the start of my Tamworth trek? I ask a train attendant and he directs me to Platform 5 and a train to St. Pancras. A rough calculation looks like I can make it to Euston and the second leg. I'm a Northerner, we don't give in. Tamworth, you're still on!

It's a slow coach (Literally, 14 stops on the way) but you probably don't know the ending of the Thameslink route as it runs from the countryside into an enclosed London tunnel with 5 short stops. I'll be in St. Pancras soon. Er...but I won't. The penultimate stop at Farringdon has me looking at my watch. The train is stuck there. 15 frustrating minutes but at last we're off. From St. I

Eventually we're at Crewe to be comforted with the news that there is signalling problems between Warrington and Wigan and we're on hold for over an hour. I look at my watch which seems to have turn into a turbo fuelled parody of the time I would like it to be. We're not moving. We will be says the train announcer. Trouble is that will be just after 3pm and the match has started. Is the trek to see Tamworth worth it? Quite honestly I'd only see the last few minutes (in hindsight an exciting period of the game!) and turned round to face south. The Crewe to Euston roars on, only stopped once as it speeds unimpaired. After 8 and a half hours of getting nowhere I'm on the train to Brighton (another hour).

The 'View from Another Planet' match report from Reading FC fans site <u>The Tilehurst End</u> says it all really:

"Well then. Where do you start with that?

At 90 minutes, this game looked like it would surely end up as a solid, encouraging start to the Leam Richardson era. Reading were two goals to the good, thanks to Lewis Wing and Mark O'Mahony, with the visitors seemingly kept at arm's length. Surely even the bizarre eight minutes of time added on wouldn't be an issue.



On 90+3, Regan Linney slammed home for 2-1, picking up a loose ball after the initial free kick had gone through the ball. Five minutes later he had his brace, thanks to a howler from Jack Stevens at the death. It took Linney just four minutes into extra-time to complete his hat-trick, Carlisle United's impressive turnaround and the Royals' embarrass-



ment.

Actually no, that's not quite right. The embarrassment didn't stop there.

Look, this is the FA Cup: weird things can and do happen. Regardless of the gulf in quality on paper - the Cumbrians sitting two divisions below us - the drama of such occasions is ripe territory for bizarre swings in fortune. If the Royals' woes had ended with Stevens' howler, or even Linney's third, that would be one thing.

But just as bad as all that - worse, really - was the limp, weak reaction to going behind. Forget tactics, formations and personnel - the fundamental nonnegotiable of any side should be to never be out-fought, always to give as much as you can. But with the score at 2-3, and an embarrassing FA Cup exit on the cards, it's as if Reading were oblivious to what was happening.

Simply put, the Royals didn't make Carlisle work hard enough for their win - bar a couple of long-range shots, their 'keeper wasn't tested. It was complacent, uninspiring and angering - as fans made clear at full-time with the loudest booing of the season.

On the one hand, this pathetic collapse wasn't that surprising. After all, teams that have just sacked a manager aren't in the best of states anyway, let alone

when it's a club with form for struggling against non-league sides in this competition.

The first half an hour was pretty encouraging for Reading, with the game quickly settling down into the pattern of the home side looking to unlock the visitors. To do that, Richardson had given the Royals a different in-possession structure, suggesting an immediate attempt at getting his new team firing as an attacking force. In build-up, Reading essentially went 3-2-4-1: Yiadom deep with the centre-backs and the double pivot staying put, Matty Jacob and Daniel Kyerewaa holding width, and Paddy Lane coming very central to provide close support for Kelvin Ehibhatiomhan.

It bore some fruit, with Reading looking stronger attacking down the left. On one occasion, around 10 minutes in, Lane and Jacob combined on that flank before Kamari Doyle finished, only for the goal to be ruled out (I think for handball).

Reading weren't to be denied for too long though. Just over half an hour in, Lewis Wing put in a corner that wasn't cleared, instead eventually coming back to him in the area, in space, allowing him to slam home past the 'keeper. 1-0.

The Royals had further chances in a half that was overall comfortable (Carlisle

offering little bar a header from a freekick that went in, but was ruled out for offside). Kyerewaa, played in by Doyle down the right, set up Ehibhatiomhan for an effort that was fired over the bar, before the centre-forward forced an excellent one-handed stop from the goalie with a powerful header (via a right-footed Lane cross from the left).

Half time: 1-0

Going again after the break has been an issue for Reading this season, and so it proved again today. Carlisle looked the stronger side in the early stages of the second half, with the Royals struggling to rebuild the momentum they'd managed before the interval.

Richardson then turned to his bench a couple of times. Yiadom (exposed defensively somewhat and tiring) was sensibly swapped out for Kelvin Abrefa on the hour mark, with Mark O'Mahony introduced for Lane, who'd continued his recent improvement.

And the Irishman had an instant impact off the bench. On 68 minutes, Doyle floated in a cross to him from the right, O'Mahony controlled well and bounced his finish home, off the turf and past the 'keeper for 2-0.

The second goal brought a lift to the

home side, with Ehibhatiomhan (pushed out to the left when O'Mahony replaced Lane) looking more confident. He forced a strong save with a low, hard effort that seemed destined for the bottom corner, while Jacob blasted over from a corner.


Richardson turned to his bench twice more in the 81st minute. On came the returning Mamadi Camara and Andre Garcia, replacing Kyerewaa and Ehibhatiomhan out wide. Though neither had a huge attacking impact and Reading did go off the boil somewhat as the second half progressed, a two-goal lead really should have been good enough.

Linney had other ideas, of course, making it 2-1 and then 2-2 in front of an ecstatic away end. While there was a freak element to both of those goals the ball going loose after a free-kick had gone through Reading's wall, and Stevens' weak goalkeeping - the goal for 2-3 was a catalogue of defensive errors. The Royals were badly stretched, ragged and then punished by his finish from the edge of the area.

I was really hoping Richardson would go in strongly in his post-match media comments, but he decided not to do so, instead taking a more analytical tone.







To be fair though, his point that Reading's performance was too polarised either side of the break - becoming too individual in the second half - was a good one.

With a seemingly ever-growing injury list, there's probably not a huge amount of changes he can make on Thursday, when Stevenage come to town. There must, however, be some kind of substantial response to this performance."

This time, organised as usual superbly by Terry McCarthy, 42 of us decided to sample the delights of the United Lounge in the East Stand.


